The Icelandic Sagas paint a picture of a well-established Viking culture across modern Nordic countries and the British Isles. They are often the only written source of social and political history in the Early Middle Ages. But they blur the lines between mythic and imaginary characters and historical events. It is however the beauty and power of the poetry for which they are most prized.

Many years ago North Country Theatre created and performed a piece of street theatre for the festival, but now they have been commissioned to perform a slightly more substantial piece, not a fully fashioned play but something of a halfway house for festivalgoers of every age. Egil's Saga was requested as it mentions Jorvik and Erik Bloodaxe, the Viking king of the city.

Poetry in Old Norse, with its peculiar punchiness and kennings*, is hard to render into modern English, but we have tried to capture some of the flavour – the distant echo of the Viking bard reciting his poetry in the fire-lit hall – whilst lightly sprinkling the story with a little modern humour.

*highly stylised metaphors for well-know ideas or objects
e.g. whale road = the sea, raven's feast = dead on battlefield

Nobby Dimon has been the Artistic Director of North Country Theatre since it was founded in 1996. He has been writer and adapter as well as director of most of the company's output since then, including acclaimed adaptations of J L Carr's A Month in the Country, Austen's Northanger Abbey and Conan Doyle's The Lost World, as well as writing the large-scale community play for Richmondshire Last Dance of a Dalesman which moved its audiences from gales of laughter to tears and back again. His adaptation with Simon Corble of Buchan's The 39 Steps inspired the West End production that received the Olivier award for BEST NEW COMEDY in 2007. Described as 'uproariously funny ...strikingly inventive' in the Guardian, as well as being the Critic's Choice it also won the People's Choice Award and the Broadway production a couple of Tony Awards.

Thomas Frere first performed with North Country as Hannay in The 39 Steps and since then as Mak in Mak the Sheep Stealer, Jesus in The Passion Plays and in Moll Flanders. He made his directorial debut with The Man who Would Be King. He has performed at many repertory theatres including Liverpool Everyman, Lancaster Dukes Theatre, Southampton Nuffield, York Theatre Royal, West Yorkshire Playhouse and Bolton Octagon. He has toured with countless other productions, including the hit musical The Return to the Forbidden Planet.

Susan Jinks trained at Mountview Theatre Academy and is now an established Yorkshire-based actress. Her most recent work includes the film Babbling Fools and playing Davina Pike in Emmerdale. She has appeared in six North Country productions, including Moll Flanders, Northanger Abbey and The Electrical Wizard of the North.

Simon Kirk has appeared in tours of The Prisoner of Zenda, The Electrical Wizard of the North, The Man Who Would Be King, The 39 Steps, and Cartimandua for North Country Theatre. He has toured with companies including Midsomer Actors, Heartbreak, Found Theatre and many more. His film and TV credits include Emmerdale, The Bill, Casualty, Conviction, Mary Tudor and Historyonics. Simon also writes and directs plays and is currently working on a piece about the end of the Roman Empire in Britain for English Heritage.
